INTRODUCTION

The second volume of COBA History covers 1971-85. Like the first volume, (1938-70) emphasis has been given to the people of COBA and to duplicate bridge events and performances. The primary sources of information have been the ACBL Bulletin, newspaper articles and COBA records. Omission of names and events which should have been included is unintentional.

The first section identifies COBA officers and members of the Board of Directors by year. This secton also includes noteworthy events and accomplishments which did not fit in the other major sections. Next follow listings of present and extinct duplicate bridge clubs in the area and of those who made Life Master. Then come the winners of Regional, North American and World Championships. The volume concludes with listings of the individuals who have been honored at COBA Spring Festival banquets (other than new Life Masters) and of the bridge teachers and writers in the Columbus area.

Of the numerous data and names reported in the History a few deserve special mention in this space. First, interest in duplicate bridge within COBA territory has waned during the past 15 years. In 1970 COBA included some 1200 paid members, 27 duplicate clubs in greater Columbus and 15 out-of-town clubs. In 1985 the members numbered 882 with 8 clubs in Columbus and 16 out-of-town.

Secondly, five people, three former COBA presidents, one former Director, and one player, appear to stand above all others in terms of service and performance.

John Davis was first elected to COBA Board of Directors in 1969. Since then he has served as Vice President of the Unit five times and as President once. He has served as President of District 11 for two years and as Treasurer since 1975. He has also been a member of ACBL's National Charity Program Committee.

Norman Fischer has served as a COBA Board member for three years including two years as President. He has been President of District 11 for two one year terms. Norman Fischer is also the second ranked bridge player in COBA.

John Mesher has served on COBA Board of Directors for six years. He was an officer for five of those years, Treasurer once, Vice President once, and President three times. He was elected President of District 11 for 1985-86. He is also active as a bridge instructor.

John Hamilton has served as an ACBL Tournament Director since 1965 until his retirement in 1985. In 1968, he achieved rank as a National Director and from 1975-84 he served as Director-in-Charge of North American Championships. He also served as Advisor to District 11 for a number of years. John Hamilton, and Marc Lowe from Dayton, developed the current universally used Swiss Team pairing system.

Jeff Meckstroth has gained national and international fame as a bridge player. Since he was named the 1974 High School King of Bridge he has won one World Championship, 11 major and three minor North American Champsionships and at least 112 Regional Championships. He is a four-time recipient (one time as co-recipient) of trophies for best performance at a North American Championship. As of September 1, 1985 he has earned 12,678 Master Points.

Lastly, four of the giants of early COBA history passed away during 1982-84: G. Eloise Neil, founder of COBA; Lila L. Lehman, long-time Board member and Treasurer; Dr. Peter Volpe; and W. H. Lehman, author of the first volume of COBA History.

In conclusion, appreciation is expressed to Doris Dean and John Davis for use of their archives.
